

Chapter-1

INTRODUCTION

This is the 28th Annual Consolidated Report presented by the Lokayukta as mandated under Section 12(6) of the Karnataka Lokayukta Act, 1984 (hereinafter referred to as 'the Lokayukta Act') on the functioning of the Lokayukta and the Upalokayukta.

2. This report pertains to the functions of Karnataka Lokayukta for the financial year 2013-14, i.e. for the period from 1st April 2013 to 31st March 2014 and the report refers to the functions performed by Hon'ble Justice Dr. Y. Bhaskar Rao, Lokayukta; Hon'ble Mr. Justice S.B. Majage, Upalokayukta; and Hon'ble Mr. Justice Subhas B. Adi, Upalokayukta. The particulars of the tenure of the office held by Hon'ble Lokayukta and Hon'ble Upalokayukta, the Registrar and the Director General of Police Wing from the inception of the Karnataka Lokayukta are detailed in a chapter to this Report.

3. It is the general perception of people that Lokayukta is an institution meant for combating corruption. The role of Lokayukta is not only confined to corruption, but it extends to redressal of grievances of citizens and also to make investigation into allegations against public servants and recommending disciplinary action against them. As could be seen from the objects of the Lokayukta Act itself, the institution of Lokayukta is set up for the purpose of improving the standards of public administration, by looking into the complaints against administrative actions, including the cases of corruption, favouritism and official indiscipline in administration machinery. Thus, the Lokayukta oversees the Good Governance of the State. Providing efficient and corruption free administration and thereby ensuring good governance is the paramount responsibility of every

democratic Government. It is said that Corruption is the friend of the rich and the enemy of the poor. Besides causing irreparable damage to the trust and public confidence in systems which affect people's daily lives, corruption threatens security of the Country, Corruption undermines political, social and economic stability and leads to maladministration. There cannot be any dispute that the Karnataka Lokayukta has acquired nationwide image and prestige as a premier institution fighting corruption and monitoring good governance.

4. The Institution of Lokayukta, therefore, is an independent forum available to public through which they can effectively ventilate their grievances against administrative excesses and lapses and obtain redressal of their grievances. It can also by way of recommendation to Government suggest remedial actions in suitable cases. This Institution has proved to be an effective watch dog against injustice being caused to the citizens, and thereby monitor state actions towards the ideals of a welfare State.

5. Lokayukta, it refers not only to an institution but also to the Head of the Institution. A person who was a Judge of the Supreme Court or a Chief Justice of a High Court can be the Lokayukta and a person who was a Judge of any High Court can be the Upalokayukta.

6. Lokayukta has jurisdiction over any action taken by or with the approval of the Chief Minister, any other Minister or Secretary or a Member of the State Legislature or any other public servant notified by the State Government. Further, the State Legislature has amended the Lokayukta Act by Act No.25 of 2010 and according to which, the Chairman, the Vice-Chairman (by whatever name called) or a member of an Authority, Board or Committee, a Statutory or Non-statutory

Body or a Corporation, established by or under any Law of the State Legislature including a Society, Cooperative Society or a Government company within the meaning of Section 617 of the Companies Act, 1956, nominated by the State Government, comes within the jurisdiction of Lokayukta. Further, all public servants holding a post of pay carrying either a fixed pay, salary or remuneration of more than Rs.20,000/- per month or a pay scale, the minimum of which is more than Rs.20,000/- (as on 23.7.2010) as revised from time to time, come within the jurisdiction of Lokayukta. All other public servants come within the jurisdiction of Upalokayukta.

7. To assist the Lokayukta or Upalokayukta in their functioning, officers from judiciary and Departments of Police, Prosecution, Public Works, Statistics and State Accounts work on deputation in the Lokayukta organization. In addition, the Lokayukta or Upalokayukta can take the assistance of any officer of the State and Central Government and any other agency.

8. While the Lokayukta Police deal with cases under the Prevention of Corruption Act, the rest of the officers in the institution of Lokayukta assist the Lokayukta and Upalokayukta in dealing with the complaints from the public for redressal of their grievances in relation to the commissions and omissions of the public servants in the discharge of their official duties.

9. The Lokayukta Act provides that the Lokayukta or the Upalokayukta depending upon their allotted jurisdiction can question the arbitrary acts on the part of the public servants and even initiate prosecution in cases where criminal offences are found to have been committed by public servants.

10. During the current financial year, the Lokayukta and Upalokayuktas, apart from receipt and disposal of complaints, have also visited many District places and received the complaints from the publics and heard them in public before the concerned public officers. Many of such grievances have been redressed at the spot itself. The Superintendents of Police and other officers of the police wing of the Karnataka Lokayukta, posted in district Head Quarters are also instructed to visit every taluk coming under their jurisdiction after giving wide publicity and afford an opportunity to the aggrieved citizens to make their complaints and if possible to redress their grievances with the assistance of the concerned officers of the Government. In such cases where grievances could not be redressed at the spot, the complaints are sent to the head office at Bengaluru and the matter will be investigated into by the Lokayukta or Upalokayukta as the case may be.

11. 24x7 HELPLINE is functioning in Karnataka Lokayukta to take care of cases of emergency is functioning round the clock and in many cases, the same has proved to be very helpful to the aggrieved citizens in getting immediate and timely relief in Government offices particularly in hospitals and police stations throughout the State in emergency situations. The said facility can be availed by dialing 155320 and 18004255320 which are toll free numbers. 24 x 7 HELPLINE can also be availed by dialing 22375014.

12. The Lokayukta and Upalokayuktas have also taken Suo Moto notice of the incidents, which in their opinion is the subject of grievance or an allegation. There is a website for Lokayukta Institution, www.lokayukta.kar.nic.in, wherein the complainants can

access their complaint status filed in Lokayukta institution. Complaints from the public are also received by the officers/officials of Karnataka Lokayukta in the offices situated at all District Headquarters and thereafter, the same are forwarded to the Head Office at Bengaluru for taking further action.

13. During this year, there is considerable progress in the disposal of complaint cases that were pending in this institution, which is attributable to the work done by the officers concerned who function as scrutiny and enquiry officers.

14. The details of the complaints investigated into under the Lokayukta Act, enquiries conducted under Karnataka Civil Services (Classification, Control and Appeal) Rules, 1957, cases investigated by the Lokayukta Police for the offences under the Prevention of Corruption Act and investigations handled by the Technical Wing of the institution are indicated in detail in this report.

Chapter-2

INVESTIGATION OF COMPLAINTS UNDER THE KARNATAKA LOKAYUKTA ACT, 1984

I) Petitions without Form No.I & II:

Every complaint under the provisions of the Lokayukta Act should be made in the form of a Statement (Form No.I) supported by an Affidavit (Form No.II), as provided under Section 9(2) of the Karnataka Lokayukta Act. There are number of petitions, including anonymous, pseudonymous and others received in the Karnataka Lokayukta office. Those petitions are also examined and wherever the address of the complainant is available and where such allegations/ grievances made in the complaint could be investigated under the provisions of Karnataka Lokayukta Act, Form No.I and Form No. II would be sent to them for compliance. The complaints which contain allegations relating to contravention of Prevention of Corruption Act, 1988 will be referred to the Police Wing, if the same could form a basis as source information for their action under the provisions of the said Act. Anonymous or pseudonymous complaints will also be considered for taking suo-moto investigation in appropriate cases. During the period from 01/04/2012 to 31/03/2013 totally 4770 miscellaneous petitions have been received and dealt with accordingly.

II) Complaints in Form No.I with Affidavit in Form No.II

The complaints which are filed in accordance with the provisions of Lokayukta Act and Rules have been registered such complaints are initially scrutinized by the Scrutiny officers. After making such preliminary scrutiny, if the Lokayukta/Upalokayuktas proposes to proceed to conduct any investigation under the Lokayukta Act, the copy of the complaint will be sent to the public servant concerned and the competent authority and such public servant will be given an opportunity to offer his comments on such complaint. If the complaint is frivolous or vexatious or is not made in good faith or there are no sufficient grounds for investigating or, for continuing the investigation; or other appropriate remedies are available to the complainant, the Lokayukta/Upalokayukta may refuse to investigate or cease to investigate such complaint after recording reasons and communicates the same to the complainant and the public servant concerned.

In conducting the investigations into the complaints as per the provisions of the Karnataka Lokayukta Act, the Lokayukta/ Upalokayuktas will be assisted by the Additional Registrars/ Deputy Registrars/ Asst. Registrar (Legal Opinion)/ Public Prosecutor. The Lokayukta/Upalokayukta will also get the complaints investigated through the Technical Wing or the Police Wing of the Lokayukta organization. Further, the Hon'ble Lokayukta/ Upalokayukta may also utilize the services of officers of the State Government or officers of the Central Government with the concurrence of that Government or the services of any other person or agency for investigation of the complaints, U/Sec. 15(3) of the Lokayukta Act.

Further, the Lokayukta/Upalokayukta shall not conduct any investigation under the Act in case of complaints involving grievance in respect of any action specified in Schedule –II, namely,

- a) Action taken for the purpose of investigating crimes relating to the security of the State.
- b) Action taken in the exercise of powers in relation to determining whether a matter shall go to a court or not,
- c) Action taken in matters which arise out of the terms of a contract governing purely commercial relations of the administration with customers or suppliers except where the complainant alleges harassment or gross delay in meeting contractual obligations.
- d) Action taken in respect of appointments, removals, pay, discipline, superannuation or other matters relating to conditions of service of public servants but not including action relating to claims for pension, gratuity, provident fund or to any claims which arise on retirement, removal or termination of service.
- e) Grant of honours and awards.

Further, the Lokayukta/Upalokayukta cannot investigate any complaint involving grievance if the complainant has or had, any remedy by way of appeal, revision, review or other proceedings before any Tribunal, Court, or other authority and has not availed of the same.

3) The Lokayukta/Upalokayukta for the purpose of any investigation (including preliminary enquiry before such investigation) under the Lokayukta Act, is empowered to summon relevant documents and witnesses and record evidence.

4) If the Lokayukta/Upalokayukta is satisfied that the action of the public servant has resulted in unjust or undue hardship to the complainant or to any other person, a report will be sent to the Competent Authority under Section

12(1) of the Lokayukta Act, recommending that such injustice or hardship shall be remedied or redressed in such a manner and within such time, as may be specified in the report and the Competent Authority shall within one month of the expiry of the period specified in the report, intimate the Lokayukta or the Upalokayukta the action taken on the report under Section 12(2) of the Lokayukta Act.

5) If the Lokayukta/Upalokayukta is satisfied that an allegation is substantiated either wholly or partly, a report will be sent to the Competent Authority under Section 12(3) of the Lokayukta Act, recommending suitable action and such Competent Authority shall within three months of the date of receipt of the report, intimate the Lokayukta/Upalokayukta the action taken or proposed to be taken on the basis of the report under Section 12(4) of the Lokayukta Act.

6) If the Lokayukta/Upalokayukta is satisfied with the action taken or proposed to be taken on the recommendation or findings under section 12(1) or 12(3) of the Act, the case will be closed under Section 12(5) of the Act, under intimation to the complainant, the public servant and the competent authority concerned; but where he is not so satisfied and if he considers that the case so deserves, he may make a special report to His Excellency the Governor of Karnataka under Section 12(5) of the Lokayukta Act and also inform the Competent Authority concerned and the Complainant.

7) The statements and details regarding the complaints received, disposed off and pending for the year 2013-14 are furnished herein below.

Chapter-3

DEPARTMENTAL ENQUIRIES

The Government on taking action on the recommendations made in the Reports sent by the Hon'ble Lokayukta or Hon'ble Upalokayukta under Sec. 12(3) of the Lokayukta Act, will entrust enquiries against the Respondents to the Hon'ble Lokayukta or the Hon'ble Upalokayukta, under Rule 14-A of the Karnataka Civil Services (Classification, Control and Appeal) (Third Amendment) Rules, 1957. In pursuance to the said entrustment of enquiry by the Government, Hon'ble Lokayukta/ Upalokayukta will nominate the Inquiry Officer to frame charges, conduct Inquiry and submit the report. In respect of the enquiries entrusted to the Hon'ble Lokayukta/ Upalokayukta by the Government under Rule 14A of the said CCA Rules, after conducting the enquiry, the Enquiry Officers will submit their reports to the Lokayukta/ Upalokayukta, as the case may be, recording their findings on the charges along with supporting evidence and connected records. In turn, these Reports will be sent to the concerned Disciplinary Authority by the Hon'ble Lokayukta/ Upalokayukta, along with their recommendations. On receipt of the same, the Disciplinary Authority will take action in accordance with Rule 11-A of the Karnataka Civil Services (C C & A) Rules, 1957.

Chapter-4

CASES REGISTERED UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF PREVENTION OF CORRUPTION ACT, 1988

Apart from investigation under the Lokayukta Act, the Police officers deputed to the Karnataka Lokayukta institution are vested with powers to register and investigate the cases under the provisions of the Prevention of Corruption Act, 1988.

(i) Whenever the Public servant possesses assets disproportionate to his known sources of income and if there is any information or a complaint in this behalf, the definite sources will be collected discreetly by the Police of Karnataka Lokayukta and a case will be registered under Sec.13(1)(e) read with Sec.13(2) of the Prevention of Corruption Act, 1988 and raid will be conducted to unearth the valuables, such as gold, cash and other movable and immovable properties.

(ii) Whenever a public servant demands for himself or for any other person any valuable thing or pecuniary advantage as a motive or reward for showing an official favour without any public interest by abusing his position as a public servant, and if there is a formal complaint in this behalf by the complainant before the Police, a case will be registered under Sec.7 and 13(1)(d) read with Sec.13(2) of the Prevention of Corruption Act, 1988 and a trap will be laid by the Lokayukta Police. If the suspected public servant accepts the bribe by handling the currency notes, then he will be arrested and further investigation will be held on the matter.

(iii) Further, the Lokayukta Police, on the basis of the credible information of misappropriation of funds or irregularity will register the case under Section 13(1)(c) of the Prevention of Corruption Act, 1988 and the case will be investigated.

(iv) Other than raid and trap cases registered under the Prevention of Corruption Act 1988, there are also other cases handled by the Police, entrusted to them for preliminary investigation under the Lokayukta Act.

(v) After investigation of the cases registered under the Prevention of Corruption Act, 1988 if a prima facie case is made out against the erring public servants, they will be prosecuted in a competent Court of Law. As per Sec.19 of the Prevention of Corruption Act, the Disciplinary Authority has to accord sanction for prosecuting the public servants, after applying its mind to the facts and circumstances of the case. The Police, after investigation will send a report to the Disciplinary Authority along with all the relevant materials and evidence collected during the course of investigation for according such Prosecution Sanction Order. On according the prosecution sanction, charge sheet will be filed before the competent Court of Law for prosecuting the accused. If on investigation, no case is made out against the accused, a report will be submitted to the competent Court of Law, for closure of the FIR already submitted to the Court.

Chapter-8

PRO-ACTIVE MEASURES TAKEN BY LOKAYUKTA DURING THE YEAR 2013 -14

Hon'ble Justice Dr. Y. Bhaskar Rao, assumed the office of the Lokayukta – State of Karnataka on 14/2/2013 and functioning as such since that date. Apart from investigation of Complaints and Government references and their disposals of his jurisdiction, Hon'ble Lokayukta has taken up the following pro-active actions in the interest of public and good governance. Hon'ble Lokayukta visited number of Districts and places and issued directions to the concerned officers/ authorities for taking appropriate steps for remedial measures and to establish good administration in their Departments, by strict compliance of relevant Acts, Rules framed by the Government in respect of their Departments. Some of such measures taken are as under:-

1) ERADICATION OF MAL-ADMINISTRATION AND IMPROVING THE EDUCATIONAL SYSTEM IN GOVT. COLLEGES

The Hon'ble Lokayukta, on 29/7/2013 visited the Government College for Boys' at Kolar and found that out of 58 Lecturers only 5 were present and while inspection was going on 4 Lecturers came to the college. During the inspection of some of the class rooms, it was found that even though students were in the classrooms, the lecturers were not present at the college time. After noticing such an unpleasant situation and also after coming to know about similar conditions in some other colleges in the State of Karnataka, a meeting of the Principal Secretary to Government, Higher Education with the Commissioner and Director of Collegiate Education was called on 2/8/2013 and detail directions are issued.

In pursuance to the directions issued, the Department has taken some disciplinary action against the erring teaching staff of the Government College for Boys' Kolar. Immediately, after the directions in 31 Government Colleges, the attendance system of lecturers are maintained through Face-Bio metric system. In respect of 331 Colleges and 6 Regional Joint Director's office, GSM/SIM based Face & Finger Identification Monitoring system has been installed and through which attendance is being monitored. Further

periodical inspection of the Colleges by the Director of Collegiate Education is being done.

2) ERADICATION OF MAL-ADMINISTRATION AND PROVIDING BASIC INFRASTRUCTURAL FACILITIES TO VARIOUS HOSTELS IN THE STATE OF KARNATAKA.

The visits made to hostels in several districts by the Hon'ble Lokayukta revealed that the inmates have been dumped in a room which is not sufficient for their stay. In some hostels, the bathrooms and lavatory provided are totally insufficient. The inmates have not been provided with sufficient food and the other infrastructures like library, etc., are totally absent. In one of the hostels at Gulbarga, the inmates have reported about the cruel nature of the Warden, in that no food was served to the inmates for many times and the inmates were used for cleaning toilets, etc. For providing the basic infrastructures and also for protecting the welfare of the inmates of the hostels in Karnataka, which they are entitled to, a meeting of Principal Secretary to Govt. Social Welfare Department; Minorities Welfare Department, Backward Classes Department; Commissioner for Social Welfare, Director of Scheduled Tribes Welfare and Commissioner for Backward classes, was convened on 7/8/2013. After discussing the problems of the hostels, instructions were given for providing better facilities to the inmates of the Hostels. It is not out of place to mention that in the hostel at Gulbarga mentioned above, the Warden against whom the complaints are received has been transferred with immediate effect. It was also directed to form a team of three persons, not being the Government officers, to inspect the hostels in each District and to submit a report regarding drawbacks they found in them.

After the meeting and instructions The Principal Secretary to Government, Social Welfare Department by his letter No. SWD 108 Coordination 2013 dated 7/1/2014 has submitted compliance report received by him from the Commissioner of Social Welfare. According to the said report, there are totally 1728 hostels run by Social Welfare Department in the State. The total sanctioned strength of inmates for these hostels is 1,44,978. Out of these total hostels 1389 hostels are in own building, 339 hostels are being run in rented building. It is also reported that 183 buildings are under construction. For the year 2013-14 an estimation of ₹145.49 crores has been submitted for construction of 1255 additional rooms, 1329 toilets and 1340 bath

rooms in the existing hostels and estimation worth of 26.84 crores for repair of 122 hostels. The Commissioner has reported that the above said repairs and constructions would be completed within the stipulated time and there would be no shortage of toilets, bathrooms, or rooms for inmates in the hostels. It is also reported that actions are being taken for providing beddings, qualitative and adequate food, health checkups for the inmates.

Similarly the Director of Minorities Welfare Department has submitted his compliance report by his letter No. MWD/Hostels/Cr.1/2014-15 dated 30/5/2014. According to the said Reports, totally 124 hostels are being run by the Minority Welfare Department in the State. 51 Hostels has its own building, The others are being run in rented buildings. Further it is also reported that for 13 hostels land for building has been procured and in respect of 43 hostels construction work is in progress. The report also mentions about the infrastructures available in those hostels.

With regard to Backward Classes Welfare Department, it is stated that totally 1982 hostels are being run by the Department. Apart from the said Hostels, there are 37 Ashrama Schools, Private run aided Pre-Metric hostels and private run post metric hostels and private orphanages totally 315 in number. Out of these hostels, 1218 hostels are run in own building; 730 hostels are being run in rented buildings; remaining 34 hostels are run in free buildings.

3) PROVIDING OF MINIMUM BASIC FACILITIES LIKE DRINKING WATER, TOILET, DISPOSAL OF GARBAGE AND PARKING AT K.R. MARKET, BANGALORE.

On 1/9/2013, the Lokayukta when the K.R. Market at Bangalore was visited on 1/9/2013, the Flower Merchants' Association complained regarding non-availability of minimum basic facilities like drinking water, toilet facility, disposal of garbage and parking of vehicles at K.R. Market. Immediately, meeting of Commissioner of Bruhat Bangalore Mahanagara Palike & Commissioner of Police, Bangalore City was convened on 27.9.2013, and instructions were issued for repair of existing toilets by providing water connections and also maintenance and cleaning of toilets at frequent intervals. It was also instructed for providing drinking water at vintage points at the K.R. Market and keep open the Cellar area for parking of vehicles.

4) STREAMLINGING THE COLLECTION OF PARKING FEES WITHIN THE AREAS OF BRUHAT BANGALORE MAHANAGARA PALIKE

There was strong allegation in the Print and Electronic media about levying of excess or illegal collection of parking Fee by the Bruhat Bangalore Mahanagara Palike. In this regard, a meeting of officers i.e., Principal Secretary, Planning and Commissioner for Urban Land Transport and concerned Police Officers was convened on 27/9/2013. They were directed for identification of parking places in various localities of Bangalore City and to put up the Boards at conspicuous places, displaying of Boards regarding the Parking fee, prosecute the illegal collection/excess collection of parking fee, issuance of Parking fee tickets, conducting of surprise check of parking lots by the Police officers regarding collection of fee without issuing tickets/receipts of excess collection, etc. or collection of fee by private/unauthorized persons.

5) DIRECTIONS ISSUED FOR TAKING CARE OF DIABETIC PATIENTS IN THE STATE OF KARNATAKA – AVAILING THE SERVICES OF EXPERTS BY USING MODERN TECHNOLOGIES, ETC.

During the visit of Lokayukta to various Government hospitals, it is found that many diabetic patients are undergoing treatment and some of them are subjected to dialysis for kidney failure also. The statistics of a study revealed that 62.4 million lives with diabetes in India, 77.2 million people are with pre-diabetes. These results show the evidence of increase in prevalence of diabetes not only in urban areas but also in rural areas. In view of increase in diabetes, certain instructions are issued to the Principal Secretary to Government, Health and Family Welfare Services Dept. , Bangalore for taking care of the diabetic patients at the pre-stage itself by obtaining the opinion of diabetic experts and through modern technologies.

6) ERADICATION OF MAL-ADMINISTRATION & IMPROVING THE QUALITY OF EDUCATION AMONG THE PRIMARY SCHOOL CHILDREN IN GOVERNMENT SCHOOLS IN THE STATE OF KARNATAKA.

During the visits to some of the Government schools at Kolar, Gadag and Dharwad, the Lokayukta observed that the standard of education to the students of primary school is not up to mark and it

needs improvement. Some of the students in those schools are not even able to read a simple lesson from the text book. As per the data, there are nearly 60,000 primary and secondary education schools in Karnataka, including the private aided and unaided schools. A duty is cast upon the Government under the Right of Children to Free and Compulsory Education Act, 2009 to ensure good quality elementary education conforming to the standards and norms specified in the schedule. Therefore, all the schools, including the private aided and unaided primary and secondary schools have to adhere to the conditions prescribed under the Act. In this connection, a meeting of Principal Secretary to Government, Primary & Secondary Education was convened on 19th November 2013. The Secretary is directed to give instructions to all Deputy Director of Public Instructions in the District to contact the convent school or standard private school. Send the teachers of Govt. School to observe the methodology used for teaching and to monitor the improvement of writing and reading standards by the Block Education officers. The Chief Executive Officer of Zilla Panchayath are to monitor the progress regularly by conducting meetings with the Block Education Officer and DDPI. Block Education Officers to prepare a report of status of improvement of all the schools in the State and send the same to the Education Secretary.

In compliance to the said instructions, the Principal Secretary to Government, Primary & Secondary Education, Education Department, Bangalore has given his interim report by his letter No. ED 170 Infn. 2013 dated 8/4/2014. In the report, it is stated that Education quality Monitoring Cell has been formed for improvement of quality of education and on 6/3/2014 the first meeting of the EQMC has been conducted and certain decisions have been taken. Programmes have been formed to implement the directions of the Lokayukta by declaring the academic year 2014-15 as “Learning Year”. Further, it has been resolved to continue to implement the points noted in the report for the year 2014-15. For providing quality education, Vision Document Programme has been formed. Effective implementation of “Nali Kali” Programme have been undertaken. It is also decided to give training to the teachers in respect of new syllabus introduced for 3rd, 4th, 7th and 10th Standards. Special Attention is given for class-wise learning abilities, especially in the subjects of English, Mathematics and Science. Further action is being taken for introduce English subject from 1st standard itself.

In the report it is stated that further in regard to the abilities of children for mathematical calculations, they have conducted a study of primary schools and after assessment of their capacities, it has been decided to take up Mathematical Movement with the active collaboration of private firms to achieve grade level competencies.

7) ERADICATION OF MAL-ADMINISTRATION & DELAY IN ISSUANCE OF HAKKU PATRAS – DIRECTIONS ISSUED FOR STREAMLING THE ISSUANCE OF HAKKU PATRAS

As there were several complaints through electronic media and also print media that hakku patras for the house sites/houses allotted to the beneficiaries are not distributed in Gadag District and there is also demand for bribe money for issuing the said hakku patras, a suo-motu investigation was taken up and certain instructions were given. On 18th November 2013, the Chief Executive Officer of Zilla Panchayath, Gadag appeared before Lokayukta and submitted that they have issued hakku patras except for 185 houses. He was directed to issue the hakku patras on or before 6th December for the remaining houses and also to issue paper publication that no money needs to be paid for hakku patras and the date for issuance of such hakku patras. Accordingly, out of 185 hakku patras, 158 were issued; 8 people died and stated that later their legal representatives were identified and they were issued hakku patras. For the remaining hakku patras it is stated that some persons have left the village. The CEO filed statement along with documents on 6th December 2013, accordingly, the orders are passed in File No. LOK/BGM-2678/2013.

Further in respect of issuance of Hakku Patras in the entire State, it has come to the notice that there is inordinate delay in the process of selection of the allottees, securing of land and formation of layouts and physical distribution of sites/houses to the beneficiaries, granting hakku patras under the various schemes of the Government and hence a suo-motu cognizance was taken up and directions were issued to the concerned authorities for expediting the matters in relation to the above. In certain cases the issuance of hakku Patras and allotment of sites/houses is pending since 2005. On 5th February 2014, a meeting of the Principal Secretary to Government, Housing Department, Bangalore; Managing Director of Rajiv Gandhi Rural Housing Corporation Limited; Joint Director (Technical) of Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Scheme was convened and after due deliberations, directions were issued for issuing the

Hakku Patras in respect of the Urban & Rural Housing Sites and cluster houses, immediately.

- 1) In respect of allotment Rural sites, it is reported that out of 83,066 beneficiaries already selected throughout the State, 64,447 beneficiaries have been issued with Hakku Patras and physical possession of sites have been handed over in respect of 54,033 beneficiaries. That means as on 5/6/2014 still 18,619 beneficiaries have to be issued with hakku Patras and out of the beneficiaries who have been issued with hakku patras, 10,414 beneficiaries have to be issued with physical possession of sites. Further only 72,889 sites have been formed and still 10,177 sites have to be formed.
- 2) In respect of formation and allotment of Cluster houses in the Rural Areas, it is reported that as on 5/6/2014 out of 23613 beneficiaries, construction of 21,030 houses have already been completed and 17,697 beneficiaries have been given with possession of houses. Thus out of the completed houses, still for 3333 beneficiaries, the houses has to be handed over. Further for 4487 beneficiaries, the hakku Patras have to be issued.
- 3) With regard to urban sites, it is reported that as on 5/6/2014, 53,990 beneficiaries have been selected and 52,914 sites have been formed. That means still 1076 sites have to be formed at different ULBs. 27,236 beneficiaries have been issued with hakku Patras and 26,754 beneficiaries are still due to be issued with hakku Patras. Out of the beneficiaries who have been issued with hakku Patras, 20683 beneficiaries have been given possession of the sites and still for 6553 beneficiaries possession of sites have to be issued.
- 4) With regard to Urban Cluster houses, it is reported that as on 5/6/2014, totally 33,140 beneficiaries have been selected and out of which 21,134 houses have already been completed, 5004 houses are under construction and construction of 7002 houses are yet to be commenced. Out of the houses completed, 8149 houses have been handed over to the beneficiaries and 10,762 beneficiaries have been given hakku Patras and 10,372 beneficiaries have yet to be given hakku patras.

Chapter-9

VISITS OF HON'BLE LOKAYUKTA

Hon'ble Justice Dr. Y. Bhaskar Rao, assumed the office of the Lokayukta – State of Karnataka on 14/2/2013 and functioning as such since that date. During the past two years, he has paid visits to several District Head Quarters in the State of Karnataka, in that he has visited mainly Government Hospitals and some of the Government offices. During the District Visits, number of complaints have been received and after hearing the Complainants and public servants concerned most of the complaints have been disposed on the spot itself. The Districts visited by the Lokayukta with date and the number of complaints received in those places are as under:-
